Charnwood Voices tour every two years, alternately at home and abroad. This gives the choir a chance to sing in some of the very finest cathedral and church acoustics in the UK and Europe, and this year is no exception. The choir is touring to Somerset from April 23<sup>rd</sup>-26<sup>th</sup>, giving recitals in Wells Cathedral and Bath Abbey as well as full concerts in All Saints Church, Weston-super-Mare and St Michael's Church, Bath. On previous tours the choir has sung in the cathedrals of Notre Dame, Paris and Chartres, Barcelona Cathedral, St Stephen's Cathedral in Budapest, and the Duomo in Florence as well as York Minster and Truro Cathedral in the UK.

We are looking forward this time to the delights of Cheddar Gorge, the historic Bristol waterfront and the sights of the city of Bath, as well as the sea air in Weston-super-Mare, where our hotel is based.

### A note from our Music Director:

Leonard Cohen, in his legendary song Hallelujah, wrote of the "Secret Chord that David played, and it pleased the Lord"... The idea of a secret chord is an appealing one - Arthur Sullivan's wonderfully sentimental "Lost Chord" is another example (not in our concert tonight - sorry!); Wagner had his "Tristan Chord" - actually a half diminished seventh in 2nd inversion but that doesn't sound as good!

In truth it is probably chordal progressions, the way one beautiful concordance connects to another, often involving a release of harmonic tension, which provides the undefinable beauty and mystique of so much music.

Chording in early music was sparsely textured indeed Gregorian Chant began with only one note at a time. But chords of three notes (triads) became the norm in Renaissance times, four note chords (which inevitably held dissonance because of the closeness of the different tones within the octave) found their way into the Baroque and Classical periods; and the richness we associate with Romantic music of the 19th and early 20th centuries is entirely dependent on those rich combinations of tone and the way in which they are deftly organised. What differentiates popular music from classical is more often the rhythmic patterns - but the Secret Chords stay much the same, and provide us with that unity in musical sound which, in turn, has the power to bind all of us together...

### MUSIC DIRECTOR: Nicholas Scott-Burt

Nicholas Scott-Burt enjoys a busy and varied freelance career as a composer, conductor, organist and pianist. He has been Music Director of Charnwood Voices since 2015,



and also conducts Daventry Choral Society. He is organist and accompanist in residence at Bablake School, Coventry, where he teaches piano (classical and jazz), organ and composition as well as teaching at Uppingham School and the Robert Smyth Academy in Market Harborough; he is a classical and jazz examiner for the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music, and has contributed widely as a composer and arranger to recent ABRSM piano publications. As a composer he has written over 100 works for a broad variety of media, from 'pop songs' to symphonic scores — most recently completing a chamber concerto for Flute and Harp with seven instruments and A Short Mass on the Veni Creator.

**CHARNWOOD VOICES** is an auditioned SATB choir of some 45 voices based in Charnwood, Leicestershire. Founded as Shepshed Singers in 1977, the choir has gained a well-deserved reputation for performing neglected and unfamiliar music as well as better known and popular pieces, both sacred and secular. The choir became 'Charnwood Voices' in 2016.

The choir mostly performs a capella, but every two years performs larger works with an orchestra. Charnwood Voices also undertakes tours every other Easter, either to continental Europe or in Britain. A very successful tour to Tuscany in 2017 is being followed by this forthcoming trip to Somerset.

# Do you like to sing? Why not join us?




- Singing is fun


